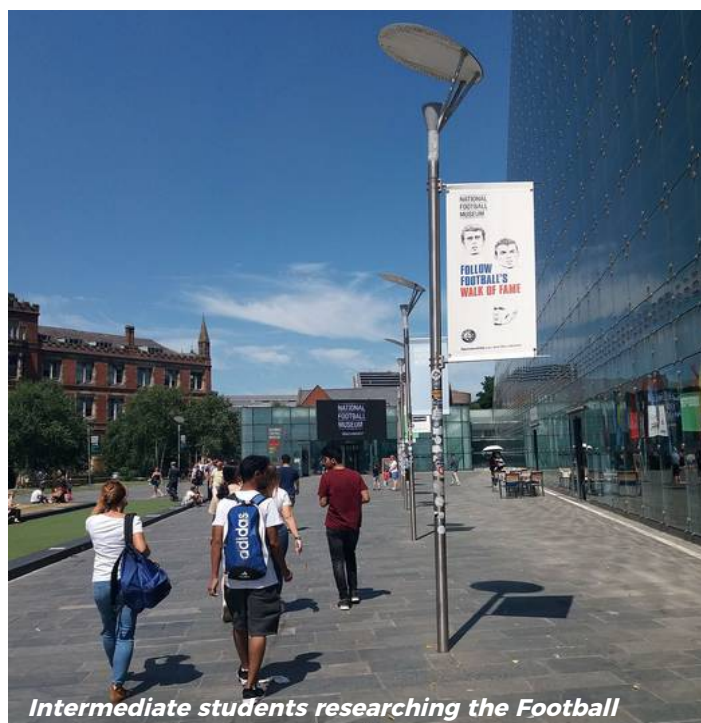
An Insider's Guide to Manchester
