3. An empty seat for an unexpected guest

It symbolises the memory of those who cannot spend this year's Christmas with us.



4. Twelve Dishes

This number refers to the twelve apostles. We fast that day, so a lot of dishes include cabbage, mushrooms and peas. One of the main meals is Karp (a kind of fish), not turkey like in the UK.

5. Sharing the wafer


It is the most important part of supper sharing a special wafer and making the best wishes with your relatives (as Jesus did when He shared bread with his disciples).


Mungo
